

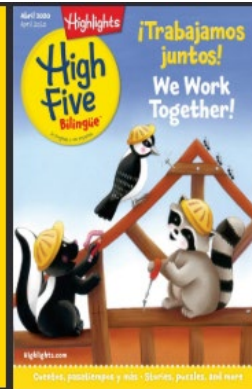

Student Account Tip Sheet: Using eBooks

1. To access an eBook using your Student Account first visit www.kcls.org/students and choose your school level (elementary or middle/high school).

Here's what you need to know about your KCLS student account:

- Your account number is your School District's three-digit number followed by your student ID (with no dash or spaces).

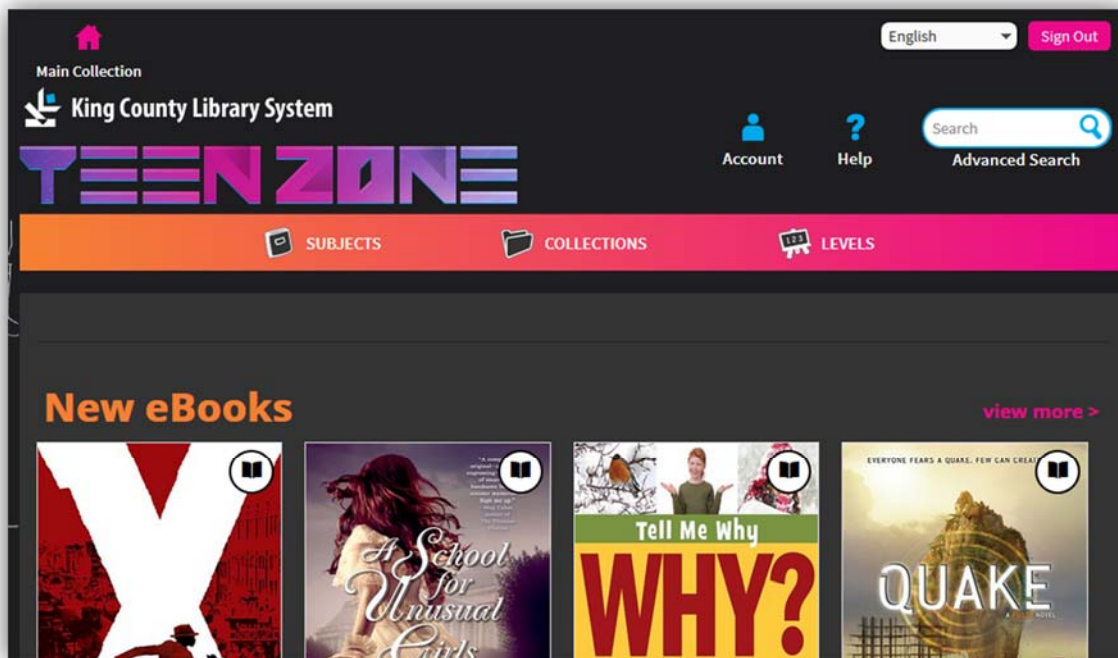

2. Click either *"OverDrive eBooks for Kids"* or *"OverDrive eBooks for Teens"*

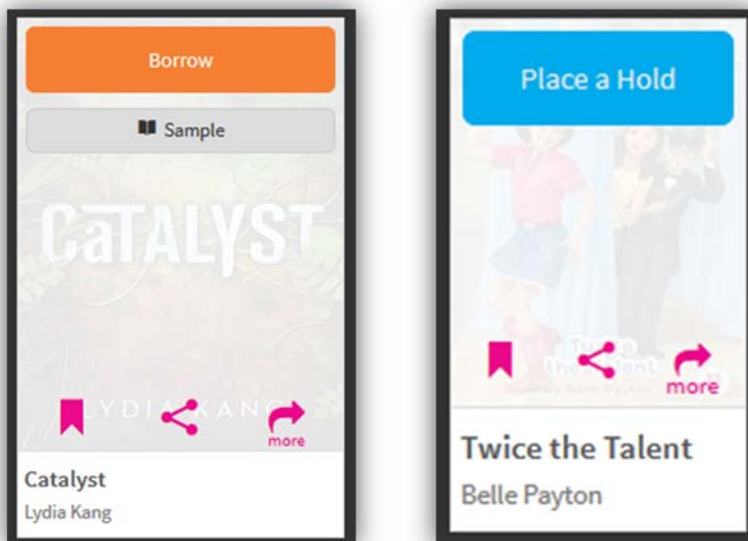

3. Browse through the featured titles or click *"Main Collection"* to search all KCLS eBooks.

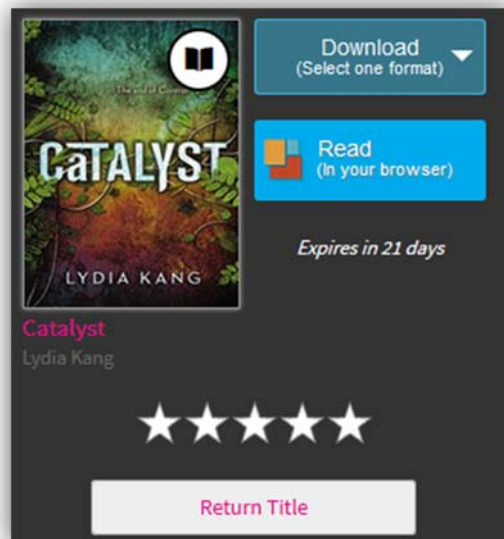


4. As you look at each eBook, you'll see two choices – "Borrow" and "Place a Hold"



5. If you see "Borrow," this means the book is available for checkout right now. Click "Borrow" and sign in. Remember, your library card number is 415sn followed by your student ID number and your PIN is the last four digits of your student ID number.

6. Click "Sign In" and your book is ready to read. Click "Read (In your Browser)" to get started.



7. If you see “Place a Hold,” this means the book is currently being used by someone else. You can click “Place a Hold” to be added to the holds list for this item. Enter your email address and click “Place Hold.”

Fill out the form below to join the holds list for this title. Once the title is available, you'll be notified that it's ready for you to borrow from your Holds page, or to download from your Bookshelf (if you have the hold automatically borrowed for you).

BOOKS BEAT SUMMER SLIDE

Children who are given access to books over the summer perform 35-40% better on reading achievement tests than those without access to books.

Tips for Preventing Summer Slide

Studies show that children who do not read or have access to books during the summer lose up to 2 months of reading performance. Those losses accumulate during the elementary school years so that by the time a child enters middle school he/she may be 2 1/2 years behind! All children, whether from low, middle or upper income families, may fall victim to the "summer slide" if not provided with summer reading opportunities. So how do we prevent the summer slide-or even accelerate reading growth?

1. Make sure your kids have access to books, magazines and newspapers that **THEY WANT TO READ**. Choice is a huge motivator!
2. Encourage them to read at least 20 minutes per day.
3. Read to them, even if they can read on their own. This helps with vocabulary development and shows reading is a priority.
4. Talk about what you're reading. Create a culture of reading in your household. Kids need reading models!

More Tips For Beating the Summer Slide

- If your child is in the dual language program make sure they are reading Spanish books as well.
- Practice matching vocabulary words on each page with items in the pictures.
- Have your child play “teacher” while you play “student.”
- Share books and reading behaviors you employ as a reader.
- For Dual Language kids, create mini books with your child in Spanish about ideas and new knowledge they’ve acquired from their English books.
- Use the ARC skills card or the attached lists to ask questions about what your child just read. Questions can be in English or your native language, regardless of the language the book is in.
- Read the pictures with your child; pictures are universal.
- Make up your own news report using pictures from informational texts.
- Make up your own narrative using the pictures in fiction books.
- Have your child read to you in English or Spanish after reviewing the pictures together.
- Make a reading plan (list of books or genres your child would like to read this summer) and track the progress together.
- Listen to audiobooks in the car! Free from the public library.
- Go to the library! (Bonus: they have free AC!)
